Volunteers have been continuing their research, currently exploring individuals from Melton's past, based on names on a map from 1871. Growing the Museum...from home One of our major projects has been working on the garden

spaces at Melton Carnegie Museum, in conjunction with other local groups. Closing the museum has meant putting this project on hold, but our volunteers have come to the rescue, growing beans, sweetcorn, herbs and other plants at home, ready for when they can be transferred to the museum.



Discover Leicestershire Collections from the comfort of your home! The archaeology collections volunteers, like most of us, are currently at

home. However, over the last few years they have been working on auditing and taking images of the collections, repacking to modern conservation standards and inputting information into the collections database.




