Volunteering at the 1620s House and Garden

The fantastic volunteers at the 1620s House and Garden have been integral in helping this beautiful heritage site spring back to life after temporary site closures due to the pandemic.

Our House Interpreter volunteers continue to provide insightful and unique guided tours of the 17th century house to visitors, as well as undertaking research. Through their research, we have found and recorded many witch marks, which are symbols or holes marked into the building to ward off evil.

Garden volunteers are integral to interpreting, developing and maintaining the beautiful early 17th Century styled gardens. Pandemic related





lockdowns meant volunteers faced their biggest challenge yet; reclaiming the gardens back from nature! They worked tirelessly on this mammoth task, ensuring the gardens were brought back to their pristine standards for the site's season opening; with a nod to the situation by preserving the wildflower garden that had self-seeded. Other recent additions they've added include; a bug hotel, a children's trail and clearing the woodland area for families to explore.

With the support of our Event volunteers the site has put on a variety of fantastic events and activities for all ages. The afterschool Thursday crafts club has been a huge success and alongside the Friends of the 1620s House and Garden, our volunteers helped welcome nearly 2,000 people at two recent Plant Fairs.

90 Years of Theatre in Market Harborough

Late last year Harborough Museum's Local Studies Volunteers visited Harborough Theatre to meet with members of the trustee committee and learn more about the impressive history of amateur dramatics in the town. After a behind the scenes tour, ideas for collaboration were shared while looking through the theatre's vast paper archive of photographs, programmes, posters and reviews.

In celebration of the theatres 90th anniversary in 2023, the groups decided to work together to curate a series of exhibits in the two Community Showcase display cases in the Local Studies section of Harborough Museum. To ensure the rich history of the theatre was captured, the team opted to display a decade per case, starting with the 1930s and 1940s, and changing displays throughout the year.

With support from Harborough Museum, volunteers chose key areas of research and wrote text for display panels. They worked closely with the theatre trustees to pick out costumes and stage props from the theatre's tremendous collection to showcase in the exhibit.

Following the holiday season, the team came together for an enjoyable afternoon to install the first display. Everyone got stuck in, sharing ideas, problem solving and learning together.

90 Years of Theatre in Harborough 1930s - 1940s is on display at Harborough Museum until Saturday 11th March 2023.

Melton Carnegie Museum's Young Person's Heritage Project

The Participation Team is working in partnership with Long Field Spencer Academy, Melton Carnegie Museum and local creative practitioners, Long Brow Arts, to create opportunitiess for young people to share how we can develop heritage and cultural activities that are relevant and interesting to them.

In October 2022, students volunteered their time at the museum's community engagement event which welcomed over 150 visitors. They spent time meeting and greeting visitors, taking feedback questionnaires, leafleting, serving refreshments and helping people learn about local history alongside the Senior Curator.

This was only the start of their volunteering journey with

the museum, and in November they embarked on a project exploring the history and heritage of their hometown. Activities have included

Introducing Charnwood Community Panel

Charnwood Museum in partnership with the Cultural Participation Team were keen to find ways of ensuring local community groups were given the opportunity for their stories and culture to be shared and represented within the museum.

Towards the end of 2022, we successfully recruited a small diverse group of volunteers to form a 'Community Exhibitions Panel'. The aim of the panel is to help support local people to have better access to the Spotlight exhibition space within Charnwood Museum. Their role is to break down the barriers which might stand in the way



of this. The panel will shape this new approach by developing a totally new process for expressing interest, offering grant support, initiating support workshops and making a film to inspire ideas- especially for people who would not usually think of making use of the space. Our volunteers are transforming how we reach our communities, share stories, make connections and promote local talent.

Q&A with Leicestershire Shared Reading



Who are Leicestershire Shared Reading (LSR)?

LSR is a voluntary organisation set up in 2016 in partnership with Leicestershire County Council's library service to support a thriving network of 'Make Friends, with a Book' shared reading groups. The groups, led by volunteer Reader Leaders, meet weekly either via Zoom or in person at public libraries around the county and are open to anyone to drop in and sit for a while, listen to stories or poems being read aloud and talk about them as a group.

What does a Shared Reader Leader do?

Shared Reader Leaders bring great literature to life using 'The Reader' model. After completing a training course Reader Leaders have access to a range of great literature to encourage the sharing of thoughts and experiences, allowing personal and social connections to be made. It's not about teaching literature but sharing it together.

What can I expect at a meeting?

Groups are very relaxed and have a friendly, welcoming feel. Each week, the Reader Leader will bring a story and poem to share with everyone. Everyone has a copy of the text so that they can follow it as it is read aloud. Throughout the session, the group will pause to reflect on the story or poem, working out what's going on together, sharing their thoughts about it, perhaps making personal connections to the literature. The Reader Leader encourages discussion, creating a safe space where members feel valued, encouraged and listened to.

Who can be a Shared Reader Leader?

We encourage anybody to apply if you enjoy reading for pleasure, are confident reading aloud, like working with people and have good time keeping skills. Training is provided to ensure you feel confident in your new role.

Navrang Arts launch the Re-building Lives exhibition 50 years of Ugandan Asians in Loughborough



"What we have been able to do here is something quite special. It immerses you because we have been able to use the whole height of the gallery and you feel enclosed within it. We try and draw you in in different ways; I don't tell you things, I use the words of the Ugandan Asians themselves, so the exhibition is full of quotes."

This is an immersive and emotive exhibition that tells the story of Ugandan Asians' journey - from their homeland India to Uganda, where they successfully established and put down roots, only to be expelled by the dictator Idi Amin in 1972. It was created almost entirely by volunteers.

Roles ranged from applying and managing the funding from The National Lottery Heritage Fund, curating the content and researching the availability of objects, photographs and film through community 'Memory Days' where people shared their objects brought from Uganda and held for 50 years. "What I really like is that I get to do different things. It's not just one thing. I've been able to interview people, I've been able to put objects in the cases, I have been able to use different kinds of software to compile the oral histories and I think this is such a cool experience. I get to do different things and it's fun as well."

Exploring local heritage

The Loughborough Library Local Studies Volunteer Group (LLLSVG) have had another busy year! You'll find the group at The Local and Family History (LFH) Centre located in Loughborough's Library, where they are on hand to support both the serious research and casual caller to explore and access the extensive collection of local and family history.

Alongside this the volunteers regularly research and curate exhibitions and produce publications with the aim of bringing interesting local history topics and themes to public notice. From Taylor's Bells Around the World to Loughborough's Art Deco Heritage; and Paget Lace -Loughborough's Lace Industry to The Golden Years of the Great Central Railwav's London Extension 1899-1957. This gives just a flavor of some of the subjects the group have researched and shone a spotlight on. Their current display The Day Loughborough was Sold - The Moira Sales of 1809 and 1810, looks at the 252 lots of Loughborough town centre properties which were sold off by the Earl

of Moira (of which 30 were public houses aka pubs!) It includes expansive research carried out about a selection of the properties auctioned, the people who occupied them, the selling price, the purchasers and associated aspects of town life in the early 19th century.
